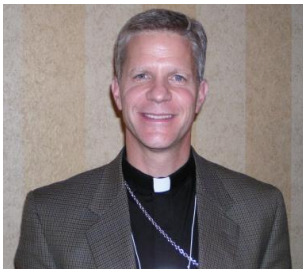

The Urgency of St. Paul

“For necessity is laid upon me. Woe to me if I do not preach the gospel!” (1 Cor. 9:16).

Paul had a mission. He had the smarts, he was on the cutting edge of Pharisaism at one time (Gal. 1:14); no one surpassed him. But when the Lord got ahold of him, he knew only one thing: He had to preach the Gospel.



His restlessness was not due to a restless soul. He had that while under the misleading dream of Pharisaism. Any system that grounds eternal existence to a person’s performance is nothing other than the Devil’s lie.

The Lord, though, captured Paul, claimed him as His own, and had him baptized by Ananias (Acts 9:18). From that grounding in our merciful Lord, Paul had a quiet and peaceful conscience. He no longer had to work to earn God’s favor; God’s favor had been given to him as a gift.

Paul’s urgency came because of two reasons: God had laid upon him the necessity to preach the Gospel to the Gentiles. God called him. God chose him to be an “instrument of mine” (Acts 9:15). Secondly, Paul’s urgency came about as a natural result of faith. Faith in Christ creates an urgency to tell others of the great and good news of a Savior who forgives.

Friedrich Pfotenhauer, the Missouri Synod’s sixth synodical president, in his 1932 address to the Synodical Convention, quoted Luther: “The Christian is a restless spirit while serenely at rest” (*At Home in the House of My Fathers: Presidential Sermons, Essays, Letters, and Addresses from the Missouri Synod’s Great Era of Unity and Growth*, translated by Matthew Harrison).

Restless and yet at rest perfectly describes the Lord's church, Paul the apostle, and the people of the Rocky Mountain District. I saw this restless spirit when I visited the Ysleta Lutheran Mission in El Paso in November. Dr. Karl Heimer and his son Steven told me of the horrific violence across the border in Juarez, Mexico. Even so, they said there is an even greater urgency to get the Gospel to those people who are shaken.

The Gospel of Christ does that to His people, who risk life and limb to get the message out. We follow in the footsteps of St. Paul. We, too, have an urgency to go and tell.

The spotlight this month is on "New Ministries," those mission congregations recently launched (or re-launched) within our District.

A New Year's Resolution for Churches

So many congregations (and their schools) struggle to fulfill their annual budget. Pastors know that the Lord has entrusted their members with the needed financial resources to do His work,

but it is a constant battle to encourage them to exercise solid stewardship of those gifts in the service of His kingdom.

A suggestion for a new year's resolution for your church or school: Identify a specific mission cause (or two or three) completely outside your congregation for special support from your members. Set a goal and organize a "prayer and giving" plan to reach that goal. Use the promotion and support of this cause to help focus the congregation on why it exists by God's will.

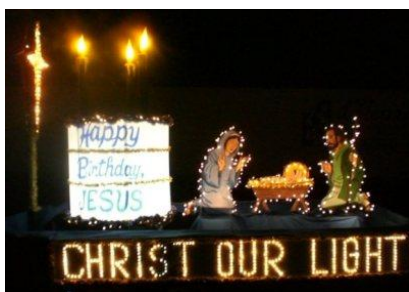
Won't this adversely affect your general Sunday morning giving? Probably not. People give out of "different pockets" for different causes. Actually, what is more likely to happen is that your members will view your local ministry more positively as well, which will lead them to be more generous in their support.

But what if your church is entering a capital campaign for building expansion? No problem. Simply determine that you will devote a tithe of the funds you raise for your designated mission cause. It is quite likely that overall people will respond in their campaign giving in a way that more than makes up the difference. Your folks will be pleased that others, in addition to your own congregation, will benefit from the campaign.

If you need help in identifying a specific cause to support, our Rocky Mountain District has any number of mission endeavors that are worthy of special support. A simple phone call to our District's Development Director, Pastor Tom Schoech, will get you moving in the right direction.

Matthew 9:37-38 served as the theme for our District convention this past summer: *(Jesus) said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field"* (NIV). May 2010 be a year in which we both pray and work to multiply the number of workers in the Lord's harvest field!

Lutheran Hour Ministries Names New Director of United States Ministries



The Rev. Dr. Mark Larson of Aurora, Colorado, has been named Director of the United States Ministries division at Lutheran Hour Ministries. He will begin his new position on Jan. 4, 2010, and will oversee the production of **The Lutheran Hour, Para el Camino,** and **Woman to Woman** radio programs, the ministry's print outreach materials, ministry fulfillment and referral services, and the **LHM Men's NetWork**, an online program launched in January 2009 to help congregations reconnect with men and build local men's ministries.

"We are most pleased to add someone with Mark's extensive skills into this important leadership position here at Lutheran Hour Ministries," said LHM Executive Director Bruce Wurdeman. "Our staff looks forward to working with this gifted man of God."

Larson currently serves as District Executive—Missions for the Rocky Mountain District of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, a position he has held since 2000. He oversees the mission and evangelism programs for the District, which includes Colorado, New Mexico, Utah, and El Paso, Texas.

Under his leadership, the Rocky Mountain District received the 2008 Executive Director's *Ablaze!* Award from LCMS World Mission for a series of evangelism conferences called *Conversations of Grace*. These conferences equipped the body of Christ for outreach through many partners, including Lutheran Hour Ministries.

Larson's other ministry service includes appointment by LCMS President Dr. Gerald Kieschnick to serve on the President's Blue Ribbon Task Force for Hispanic Ministry, as well as service on the National Advisory Group for Missions, the Executive Committee of North American Mission Enablers, and Frontera Ministries. He has played a key role in the founding of the Lutheran Hispanic Missionary Institute in El Paso and serves on the Board of Directors of this institute that has a vision to raise Hispanic church planters for the LCMS.

Larson served as Associate Pastor (1988-1994) and then Senior Pastor (1994-2000) of Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church and School in Beecher, Illinois. While there he served on the Mission Board of the Northern Illinois District from 1991 to 2000. He served as the Board Chair from 1997-2000.

Raised near Grand Island, Nebraska, he received a bachelor's degree in Speech Communications from the University of Nebraska in Lincoln. He graduated with a Master of Divinity degree from Concordia Seminary in St. Louis and earned a Doctor of Ministry degree from Trinity International University in Deerfield, Illinois in 2004. He and his wife Lisa have two elementary school-aged children.

DAP Awards \$12,000 in Gifts...

The Debt Assistance Program of the Rocky Mountain District makes annual gifts to pastors serving within our District who carry educational debt. Dozens of pastors within our District annually have some of their debt reduced because of the generosity of others. This reduction of debt is a blessing to them and their families.



Grant payments for the 2009 Debt Assistance Program totaled \$12,000 this year compared to more than \$15,000 in years past, the difference being attributed to the decline in the financial market. Even during these tough economic times, 27 pastors in the Rocky Mountain District benefited from the generous gifts donated by many individuals and congregations in our District.

Investments in the Endowment Fund increased \$17,000 this year. Our sincere thanks goes out to all who made this year a success.
